ENGLISH PRACTICE BOOK LESSON: 2 THE SENTENCE

The Sentence

A group of words that makes complete sense, conveys a clear meaning and expresses a complete thought.

For Example:

food good loves everyone healthy and. Everyone loves good and healthy food.

Every sentence has two parts!

- 1. Subject and
- 2. Predicate

When we make a sentence

- 1. We name some person or thing.
- 2. Say something about that person or thing.

In other words, we must have a subject to speak about and we must say or predicate something about that subject.

- (a) So, the part which names the person or thing we are speaking about is called the Subject of the sentence.
- (b) The part which tells something about the subject is called the Predicate of the sentence.

For example:

Subject Predicate

a o jour in Touriou to

Suresh runs

Birds fly

Girls play

My brother passed the examination

It is very cold today

The dogs bark at night.

The subject of a sentence usually comes first, but occasionally it is put after the predicate also; as:

- 1. Here comes the bus.
- 2. Sweet are the uses of adversity.

However, in imperative sentences the subject is left out; as:

- Sit down—Here the subject you is understood.
- Thank him—Here too the subject 'you' is understood.

We have four types of sentences in English Language.

Types of Sentences

- Declarative Sentence or Statement
- 2. Interrogative Sentence
- 3. Imperative Sentence
- 4. Exclamatory Sentence

Declarative Sentence

It is a declaration-a simple statement of a fact. It can be negative or positive. It begins with a capital letter and ends with a full stop (.). It is also called an assertive sentence.

- I love old songs.
- I don't like liars.

Interrogative Sentence

It begins with a capital letter, ends with a question mark (?) it asks a question.

- When are you coming to Delhi?
- Why is he so upset?
- Am I late?

Imperative Sentence

It expresses commands, orders and requests.

- Clean this room fast.
- Please help me lift this box.
- Move in a line.

Exclamatory Sentence

It expresses a sudden and strong feeling. It normally begins with words like Alas! oh! wow! Hurray followed by a mark of exclamation.

- Wow! You look so beautiful.
- Hurray! We have won the game.
- Alas! She is no more.
- What a fool I am!
